A NOTE FROM THE CHOREOGRAPHER

I had to walk from my hotel to the dance studio. I had stepped off a 26-hour flight from Sydney to Berlin the night before. With only an address and a map (that was not in English), I set out. I was told the walk was about 20 minutes. But it's amazing how long that 20 minutes feels. I keep checking the map, I feel like I had gone too far, everything was new, my senses are heightened, my muscles are tense, I'm looking around, taking everything in. With only a few mistakes, eventually I find the studio.

Now jump to the following morning. Walking from the hotel to the dance studio on day two. I'm calm, relaxed, casual. I know exactly where to go, where to turn. I pass the big blue building, then turn right after the park. I've done this all before.

There's a first time for everything: job interviews, catching public transport, changing a nappy.

First Things First is about the transition between the unknown to the routine. Or, the art of getting used to something.

Because the content for this show is about first experiences, it is crucial that this performance is actually as fresh and current as it can possibly be. There are moments in tonight's show that I've never done before. And there are scenes in this work where the only instruction is to 'do something that is only appropriate for today.' With an ever-evolving show, every single performance of First Things First is, well, a first. The audience, the space, the way I'm feeling today, all affect the structure of the show.

Thank you for coming. I hope you enjoy your first experience.





ABOUT JOSEPH SIMONS

JOSEPH SIMONS was born in Dubbo, NSW. He trained at Dubbo Ballet Studio, and since graduating from the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA), has become one of Australia's busiest performers and original young creators.

Simons has worked as a dancer for Chunky Move (Connected, I Like This) Anything Is Valid Dance Theatre (All the Mall's a Stage, Save Our Soloist) and Lucy Guerin Inc. (Structure and Sadness, Untrained) touring extensively throughout Australia, UK, Asia and the United States. In 2012 he performed the title role in West Australian Ballet's production of Pinocchio.

Joseph has also been involved in creative developments with Australian Dance Theatre, Force Majeure, Lingua Franca and DV8 Physical Theatre, London.

Joseph won the Emerging Artist of the Year at the 2009 West Australian Dance awards, and after a sell-out season of his solo work *Not On My Watch*, he was nominated for Best Young Artist at the 2012 Perth Fringe World Festival.

He won the 2013 Tanja Liedtke Fellowship (awarded to one Australian choreographer bi-annually) and was offered a residency at Ufer Studios, Berlin to create a new work. *First Things First* was born, and premiered in New York in 2014.
